After much conversation I finally convinced him to be in charge of fairground rentals and maintaining the fairgrounds. Over the next ten years he managed several improvement projects at the fairgrounds including but not limited to upgrading the water and sewer infrastructure, painting all the buildings, upgrading and adding RV campsites etc. He also took the rentals to a completely different level. He had the fairgrounds rented most weekends and secured the big three rentals- the AMP, Walmart Shareholders and the Craft Fair.

The income from these rentals allowed the WCF to not only survive when other county fairs were struggling, but to make many necessary improvements over the years. Not only did Lanny take care of the grounds

and the rentals but volunteered countess hours during the fair overseeing all of the entering of the exhibitor information and writing all of the premium ribbon checks and the premium livestock sale checks. The fair will greatly, miss his passion, knowledge, guidance and tireless work ethic.

My dad was the best teacher I had in my school career. Although this is a weighty statement with no exaggeration, it likely is not a unique statement. Lanny Rice impacted the lives of hundreds if not thousands of students through his mastery of teaching and his dedication to the craft. It is not this

The greatest memory I have of my dad is one of the small, unnoticed moments that I have the privilege to know about from being his son. Lanny's major involvement in the Washington County Fair began as the Fayetteville High School Agriculture teacher as he had students involved in the fair with show project. There, Lanny became good friends with Roy Hummel, which led to a long history of friendship. Along with this relationship came more involvement with parking cars, directing traffic, emptying trash barrels and manure spreaders and cleaning the grounds during and at the end of the fair. His involvement continued as he moved on to be the Prairie Grove Agriculture teacher. His willingness to serve the Washington County Fair led him to volunteer for the role of collecting fair entry papers and processing and distributing fair exhibitor checks, and finally, working as the Fairgrounds Manager for the last 11 years.

Lanny Rice is a Godly man of integrity who has always been bold and unashamed in his faith. His example has been one of seeking to love the Lord and love other people. It has been my privilege to have known Lanny Rice for over 40 years as my teacher, mentor, teaching partner, example and friend. Lanny Rice has been actively involved in the Washington County Fair for many years. He has worn a variety of hats. This service has spanned approximately forty five years. As the Fair Board President, I've had a lot of interaction with Lanny over the years in various roles.

As a high school Agriculture teacher at Fayetteville and Prairie Grove, Arkansas, his fun loving- guiding spirit, dedication to youth and shared knowledge has touched the lives of countless students. His work was accomplished through classroom instruction, field trips, competition and FFA activities. As Fair Board President, I arranged for his use of the horticulture building and the office with the only refrigerator for his judging classes. He always left me dairy products in the fridge. When I complained, he said "just throw them out." Needless to say, by the time I found them they were sour.

When the FFA chapters parked the cars, picked up and emptied the trash, you could always count on Lanny to be present with his students in the parking lots. An adult presence, resolves many situations before they

become problems. These were critical jobs to accomplish during the fair. His scheduled days were always covered without the worry of would the assigned chapter be there as scheduled.

For several years, Lanny served as a member of the Fair Board. At one time, the premium checks were compiled and written by a person in the Extension Office. When this was no longer an option, Lanny looked at Chery West, the



treasurer, and told her they could do this task. Compiling Thompson Hall, the Youth Building and the Horticulture Building books is a monumental task because of the numerous classes and categories. This was in the first years of computerized premium records. I tried to tell them that they had no idea of what doing those books involved. Lanny told me not to worry. They had this. They would be ready to handout checks at the end of fair. We moved forward to fair week. They worked on the books during the week. On distribution day, we assembled to distribute checks. I was working in the office. I continue to hear exhibitors from these three buildings complain that their checks were incorrect. All complains were referred to Lanny, who was across the room from me. I kept hearing Lanny laugh and say "Merry Christmas." I finally went to see what was happening. He had so many errors that he took the names of those who were short to correct and he just wished the one with an overage a Merry Christmas and told them to keep the overage. I did not know until several years later that four of them had worked all night writing checks. Lanny still wishes me Merry Christmas when anything goes astray.

Lanny resigned from the Fair Board and took the job managing the grounds/buildings and the renting. He has done this for the last twelve years. It seems simple and easy until you are faced with this task. We thank

you for your work in this role.

Last year when I agreed to be the horticulture superintendent, I spent countless hours prior to the fair working on shelving for the sale items and the kitchen in the building. Lanny dug through stored shelving and moved to an area where I could paint. I took some creative work to install the shelves. As I sorted the sale items, Lanny visited often and was an excellent customer. He worked on the kitchen to help me accomplish the improvements and secure the area. He helped me with the potted plants in front of the building and stored them for me this past year. This saves transporting from the Extension Office. I asked him if he needed anything else from me and he said for me to go home.

It is an honor to recognize Lanny Rice for his years of service not only to the Washington County Fair, but also to the youth of this county. His dedication to serve, teach and advise students has touched countless lives. A sign hangs in the fair office that says, "Remember It's For The Kids!" No one exemplifies this more than Lanny, as he has certainly taken this to the next level by helping kids live up to their potential.

He started his career in 1975 as an Agriculture teacher in Greenwood Arkansas, and later moved on to Fayetteville High School. He was soon persuaded to move to nearby Prairie Grove to

teach agriculture. It was at Prairie Grove that he and longtime friend and Farmington Ag teacher, Roy Hummel, teamed up to manage parking and trash pickup at the fair. Thousands of students can tell stories of their adventures parking cars and picking up trash with Lanny Rice. But this fair book isn't big enough to tell all the stories that need to be told about him.

While at Fayetteville and Prairie Grove, Lanny was always involved with the Washington County Fair, including serving on the fair's board of directors. For the past 11 years, he has maintained the fair grounds and managed all building and ground rentals. Through the rental process, Lanny has secured much needed revenue for the fair that has allowed us to do needed upgrades.

Many years ago, Lanny talked me into helping him with writing all premium checks when that process transitioned over to us from the extension service. This task is a huge responsibility considering the thousands of checks that are written. Not only was this a new job for us, but it was the first year we would do it all by computer. At that time, all checks were given out to recipients on Saturday night. We had all the data entered and we were ready to print checks, and the computer went down. Mrs. Cassidy, who was fair board president at the time, was adamant about handing those checks out on time. Not wanting to disappoint Mrs. Cassidy and maybe wanting to prove we could do it, Lanny and I and a few very kind people helped us write those checks over the next 32 hours. We

learned a lot that year, and Lanny is still writing those thousands of checks.



WASHINGTON COUNTY FAIR **GENERAL RULES**

- 1. Exhibit halls will open at 10:00am on Tuesday and the remainder of the fair and will close at 9:00 pm each day.
- 2. Washington County Fair Early Release Schedule: Superintendents will coordinate the release of all animals starting at 8:00PM. See superintendents week of fair for schedule.
- 3. All exhibits must be entered in the name of the grower, maker, or owner. Social security or similar number must be provided by the exhibitor for record keeping and premium checks. The Fair Board reserves the right to reject any exhibit before or after entry. Exhibitors must be a resident of Washington County or a 4-H, FFA, FCCLA, or EHC member enrolled in a club or chapter in the county or student of Washington County school. The Arkansas Livestock and Poultry Commission rules prohibits an exhibitor from showing in more than one county fair each year.
- 4. No person can act as judge of a class in which he or she is an exhibitor.
- 5. No premium will be awarded on items not listed in the catalog nor on unworthy exhibits as determined by the judges. Such exhibits may be removed by the fair management. Where there is no competition, the judges will determine the placing of an exhibit based on quality.

Premiums will be paid by check. PREMIUM CHECKS WILL BE MAILED TO ALL EXHIBITORS. THEY WILL NOT BE DISTRIBUTED AT THE FAIR ON SATURDAY OR SUNDAY. PLEASE VERIFY CORRECT MAILING ADDRESS O GENERAL RULES

- 6. N EXHIBITOR LIST AT CHECK-IN.
- 7. The decision of the judges in awarding premiums is final.
- 8. Each concessionaire and exhibitor must confine themselves to the assigned space. All exhibits will be under the control and supervision of the fair management, including the right to control signs and arrangements of exhibits.
- 9. Exhibits shall be entered through the superintendent or committees in charge of each department. Claim tickets must be returned before exhibits can be removed.
- 10. In no event shall the Fair Association officers, directors, or members be held responsible for any loss or damage to the property or person of exhibitors or other people while on the Fairgrounds whether loss or damage arose from accident or any cause whatever. All diligence will be used by the officials but they shall not be responsible for any loss or mishap that may occur.
- 11. All contracts must be in writing. The price named in the contract is for immediate acceptance and unless a signed copy of the contract is delivered to the secretary at the time required therein and accompanied by the specified deposit it shall be subject to cancellation without further

notice. Verbal agreements or amendments to contracts will not be recognized.

- 12. The Fair Association reserves the right to cancel all contracts by public notice should an act of providence, such as a flood, storm, pestilence, or any outbreak of war or rioting prevent holding the fair.
- 13. All exhibits remaining on the fairgrounds after the last Sunday of the fair will become property of the Fair Association to be disposed of as it sees fit.
- 14. All rules and regulations published in the catalog are automatically made a part of all contracts with the fair.
- 15. Failure of concessionaires or exhibitors to comply with the General Department rules published in this catalog shall be subject to forfeiture of premiums and/or contract cancellation without reimbursement.
- 16. During the fair, stock trailers shall be parked outside the east fence in the designated area. No trailers will be parked inside the fairground gates. All trailers left will be towed.
- 17. HEALTH REQUIREMENTS SHALL BE MET FOR ALL LIVESTOCK TO BE ENTERED IN THE FAIR. All livestock shall enter through the livestock Main Gate #1 at the assigned time.
- 18. Handicapped Parking is available for individuals whose vehicle displays the official tag symbol. Entrance will be through Knapp Street Gate. Admission price will be charged for all but the handicapped individual.
- Livestock, Poultry and Rabbit exhibitors must pre-register their exhibits by mailing entry form to Livestock Entries: 2537 North McConnell Avenue, Fayetteville, Arkansas 72704 postmarked by August 1. Preregistration will enhance getting premium checks out in a timely manner. The form is located online at www.mywashingtoncountyfair.com.
- 20. All protest must be in writing plainly stating the cause or complaint or appeal and accompanied by \$100.00. Protest must be delivered to the management of the Washington County Fair within one (1) hour of the occasion for such protest. Judging procedures will not be interrupted for protest investigation and depending on the basis of the protest, a decision may be withheld until a thorough investigation is completed. No protest or appeal based upon the statement that the judge is incompetent will be considered by the management. All questions in dispute or difference not covered by these rules will be referred to the management whose decision will be final.

GENERAL RULES CONTINUED

- 21. During Washington County Fair all Auxiliary Vehicles must have permits. Auxiliary vehicles, including but not limited to, golf carts, service carts, utility vehicles, off road vehicles and other four-wheeled vehicles UTV/ATV. All AVs used in connection with the Washington County Fairgrounds ("WCF") are required to have a Washington County Fair Association ("WCFA") issued operation permit while on the WCF grounds, parking lots, and campground. Permits are required during move-in, the WCF, and move-out. Permits are only issued for AVs that serve to advance the operation of the WCF or that provide service to WCF vendors, exhibitors, administration staff, etc. Permits are not issued to the general fair-going public. The following requirements exist in order to receive an AV permit:
 - a. NEW: MUST PRE REGISTER BY AUGUST 1ST. PLEASE SEND FORM AVAILABLE ONLINE AND PAYMENT TO WASHINGTON COUNTY FARM BUREAU ATTN: CURTIS MOORE 1165 N. MEADOWLANDS DR. FAYETTEVILLE, AR 72704
 - b. The Fair must have a proof of liability insurance (\$1,000,000) for all vehicles before a permit can be issued.
 - c. Drivers must be 16 years or older with a valid driver's license. Must have copy filed with fair office.
 - d. Permits must be displayed on vehicle and be visible.
 - e. No more than the allotted number of people can ride on the vehicle than the available seating.
 - f. Lights must be on the front and rear with proper intensity and must be operating after dark.
 - g. Only AVs with official business permits can be used after 6:00 PM.
 - h. Sign and abide by the WCFA/WCF Auxiliary Vehicle Rules and Regulations Agreement, which includes a pedestrian always have the right of way,
 - i. Pay a \$25.00 Permit Fee.
 - j. The Following do not need to register their golf cart or ATV, but must sign AV Rules and Regulations Agreement:
 - i. Fair Maintenance Staff
 - ii. Garbage Collectors
 - iii. WCFA Board of Directors
 - iv. Personal Handicap Carts
 - v. All Emergency vehicles are exempt.
 - k. AV's without a permit will not be allowed on WCF grounds at any time. WCFA/WCF and WCFA Contracted Security each

have the authority to revoke AV permits, impound any AV, and require any privately owned AVs to be removed from the WCF grounds, in their sole discretion.

- 22. Dog and Pets: The following policy is in place not only for the safety of our visitors, but for the welfare of the animals.
 - a. No pets are permitted on the Washington County Fairgrounds during the Fair. This includes, but is not limited to, dogs, cats, ferrets, reptiles, primates, etc. and pertains to all WCF guests, exhibitors, vendors, staff, and partners. Individuals found with pet will be asked to remove them from the fairgrounds. Animals are not to be left unattended in vehicles in the parking lot under any circumstances. The authorities will be notified of any animals found unattended in vehicles. Dogs that are part of an exhibit or demonstration will be permitted.
 - b. Dogs or miniature horses that meet the ADA definition of a "service animal" will be permitted. The ADA defines a service animal as:
 - i. "Dogs that are individually trained to do work or perform tasks for people with disabilities. Examples of such work or tasks include guiding people who are blind, alerting people who are deaf, pulling a wheelchair, alerting and protecting a person who is having a seizure, reminding a person with mental illness to take prescribed medications, calming a person with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) during an anxiety attack, or performing other duties. Service animals are working animals, not pets. The work or task a dog has been trained to provide must be directly related to a person's disability. Dogs whose sole function is to provide comfort or emotional support do not qualify as service animals under the ADA."
 - ii. "Miniature horses that have been individually trained to do work or perform tasks for people with disabilities."
 - iii. Service Animals must be kept under the control of the owner." Under the ADA, service animals must be harnessed, leashed, or tethered, unless these devices interfere with the service animal's work or the individual's disability prevents using these devices. In that case, the individual must maintain control of the animal through voice, signal, or other effective controls."

GENERAL RULES CONTINUED

- iv. *For full ADA service animal requirements, please visit www.ada.gov.
- v. All animals on the WCFA/WCF grounds must be current on all vaccinations as required by state law and are required to have veterinary papers on hand as proof of current vaccinations.

23. FAIR GATE PASS INFORMATION:

- a. The Washington County Fair is one of the few fairs that does not charge for exhibits or exhibitor passes. This is a tradition the Washington County Fair Board would like to continue and we ask for your understanding and cooperation.
- b. Livestock exhibitor parking passes will be provided to each exhibitor in the following Open and Junior Divisions: Beef, Dairy, Sheep, Swine, Dairy Goats and Meat Goats.
- c. Each exhibitor 16 years and older with a valid drivers license will receive ONE CAR PARKING PASS.
- d. Each exhibitor under 16 years old will receive ONE CAR PARKING PASS and ONE WORKER PASS.
- e. Each exhibitors will then be allowed to purchase a maximum of 4 worker passes for \$5 each.
- f. Additional Worker passes will be offered to exhibitors or the public for \$15 each.
- g. NO ADDITIONAL CAR PASSES WILL BE SOLD! NO EXCEPTIONS.
- h. CAR PASS RULES & LIMITATIONS
 - i. MUST PARK IN THE NORTHEAST FENCED IN LOT, BETWEEN AAO AND RODEO ARENA.
 - ii. BETWEEN 6:00 AM 10:00 AM VEHICLES WITH A EXHIBITOR PARKING PASS MAY ENTER THE AREAS AROUND BARNS TO UNLOAD AND LOAD SUPPLIES AS NEEDED. VEHICLES REMAINING AFTER 10:00 AM WILL BE TOWED
 - iii. WORKERS IN THOMPSON HALL, HORTICULTURE, BLUE BUILDING AND HANDI CAP INDIVIDUALS MAY PARK ON THE SOUTH SIDE OF THE HORTICULTURE BUILDING.
 - iv. CAMPERS WILL RECEIVE ONE CAMPER CAR PASS. MUST PARK AT THEIR CAMPER SPOT. MUST USE SOUTH GATE TO ENTER AND EXIT.

These new rules and regulations (item 23.h) regarding parking were passed by the board of directors on May 3, 2022 meeting for the safety of everyone.

The J.O. and Marie Parker Scholarship will be given under the direction of the Washington County Fair Board and the Selection Committee, consisting of 1) The current president of the Ozark Cattleman's Association or a representative thereof. 2) A representative of Farmers Co-op. 3) A member of the Eddie Kinzer family. 4) Ralph & Reba Moore. The only exception would be if an immediate family member of one or more persons on the selection committee has applied, then the remaining appointed committee members will choose the winner. If a committee member needs to be replaced for any reason, the new committee member will be selected by the Jerry Moyer family and will be required to meet the approval of the Washington County Fair Board.

The winner shall be announced during awards picnic on Friday. Washington County Fair. The Washington County Fair will distribute the funds payable to the recipient, one half at the beginning of the fall semester and the remaining half in January at the beginning of the spring semester. The selection committee will determine the number of scholarships and amount (minimum \$500) for each scholarship in any given year.

Requirements

- 4. Applicant can not apply for this scholarship before high school graduation and after the fall semester of their junior year at an approved school. (see #3)
- 5. Applicant must have at least a 2.0 grade point average in the last semester before applying for this scholarship.

Selection Process:

If more than one applicant has met all the qualifications, the following point system shall help determine the scholarship winner or winners.

- The base of need will be given the most amount of consideration. (Parent tax return or financial statement may be requested) A list of other scholarships the student has received will need to be provided. A maximum of 50 points will be given to the most need worthy applicant.
- 2. If the applicant is pursuing a degree in the field of Agriculture at the University of Arkansas, applicant can receive 15 points. If their field of study is Animal Science or related Animal Husbandry field applicant will receive an additional 10 points.
- 3. If the applicant has shown Hereford influenced cattle 2 of the 3 years needed to meet the qualifications applicant will receive an additional 10 points.
- 4. If the applicant has been on a livestock judging team while either in college or on a high school level they will receive 5 points.

- 8. Each exhibitor must lead or drive his or her own animal into the sale ring except in the case of illness or other unavoidable reasons. Permission must be requested from the show officials IN WRITING no later than 12:00 noon, Thursday.
- 9. The Sale Committee WILL NOT handle the sale of any animals that do not make the sale order.
- 10. Final decision relative to the sale will be made by the Washington County Fair Board.
- 11. Exhibitors must have and provide a social security number to be in sale.
- 12. Animals eligible for auction stay until after the sale.
- 13. Animals that receive a white ribbon are not eligible for premium sale.
- 14. All exhibitors in the sale are required to attend the mandatory meeting exhibitor meeting at 4:00 on Thursday to ensure they understand all rules and timing.
- 15. Premium Sale Add-On Money will only be accepted through October 1st.
- 16. Premium Sale Checks will be issued on October 15th. Exhibitors are required to write thank you notes to all buyers, including add-ons contact. These notes, in addressed and stamped envelopes, are required to be turned into the Washington County Extension Office by no later than 60 days following October 15th to receive premium sale proceeds. In the event that notes are not submitted in a timely manner, the exhibitor and parent/representative will be required to attending the January Fair Board meeting before they can receive their premium.

OPEN RULES:

- 1. You may arrive at 8:00 a.m. to register and set up your cook site. This is a charcoal only cook-off! No camp stoves, smokers, barbecue grills or fire pits. Propane burners are allowed for heating water only. You are responsible for all cookware and utensils, tables, charcoal, and food ingredients. We suggest you bring a canopy in the event of rain or to provide shade.
- 2. Bring four copies of each recipe to give to the judges.
- 3. 

Fair and who are a resident of Washington County. She cannot be or at any time have been married or have had children. She must have always been female, and have not had any criminal record. A contestant must compete in and win the Fair Queen Contest sanctioned by the County Fair that is held in the county where she resides or attends school. Contestants must either legally reside or attend school (academic, not dance, etc.) in that county for one full semester immediately preceding that county's contest. In the event a contestant whose parents are divorced and live in separate counties, and has been court ordered to reside jointly with both parents, she can only compete in one of the two counties in which her parents reside.

- 7. The teen winner will represent Washington County in sportswear, evening gown and interview at the Arkansas State Fair, Little Rock, in October. The miss winners will represent Washington County in a one-piece swimsuit, evening gown and interview at the Arkansas State Fair, Little Rock, in October.
- 8. The newly crowned Miss & Teen Washington County will serve as fair ambassadors during the week of the county fair and must be available to make appearances per request of the fair board. If for any reason the Miss or Teen winner is unable to fulfill her duties as Miss or Teen Miss Washington County Fair by representing the county at the state level, she will be revoked of her crown and the First Runner Up will represent the county.
- 9. Dressing Rooms will be provided for all teen and miss contestants, but it is encouraged to bring hanging racks and mirrors.
- Teen Contestants must compete in Interview, On-Stage Question, Fitness Wear and Evening Gown Competitions. Miss Contestants must compete in Interview, On-Stage Question, Swimsuit and Evening Gown Competitions

Private Interview Competition: Street dress or suit—no hats, gloves or purses. The Interview will account for 50 percent of a contestant's total score. All interviews will be five minutes long and will be timed and monitored. Judges are instructed to avoid current affairs and religious or political questions.

Teen Sportswear Competition: Sports attire representing a favorite athletic – type sport such as baseball, basketball, cheerleading, tennis, golf, dance, etc. or any outdoor sports such as hunting, fishing, horseback riding, etc. Judging is based on choice of sport, originality of attire and on-stage modeling. Props are acceptable, but must be carried only. They cannot be used to demonstrate their choice of sports during the on-stage modeling. Sportswear will account for 15 percent of a contestant's total score. Consideration for the appropriateness and creativity of a contestant's sportswear outfit is only a part of the judging criteria in the Sportswear Competition. Overall first impression, physical fitness, energy level, proportion of figure in relation to height and weight, posture, poise, personality, stage presence, and confidence are also included.

Miss Swimsuit Competition: A one-piece swimsuit. Swimsuit will account for 15 percent of a contestant's total score. Over-all first impression, physical fitness, energy level, proportion of figure in relation to height and weight, posture, poise, personality, stage presence, and confidence are also included.

Evening Gown & On-Stage Question Competition: The Evening Gown Competition will account for 35 percent of a contestant's total score. Judging will be based on over-all first impression, beauty, stage presence, personality, grace, charm, walk, and appropriateness of evening gown and composite appearance. Each contestant will be asked an on-stage question and will be allowed a maximum of 30 seconds for their extemporaneous response. Her ability to answer confidently, as well as her tone of voice, will be included in her Evening Gown score. Judges are instructed "not to judge the gown", but to "judge the contestant in the gown."

COMPETITION CATEGORIES

There are seven (7) categories in the Arkansas State Fair Junior Youth Talent Contest. Competing acts must qualify by one of the following category descriptions:

- VOCAL SOLO shall consist only of a vocal performance by one vocalist. CD's used for accompaniment will be allowed to provide limited vocal background but is not suggested.
- VOCAL SOLO with ACCOMPANIMENT you may accompany yourself with a musical instrument such as a guitar, keyboard, ukulele, etc. while singing. A keyboard will be provided.
- VOCAL GROUP shall consist of two or no more than ten vocalists. No other talent may be performed. CD's used for accompaniment will be allowed to provide limited vocal background but is not suggested.
- DANCE SOLO shall consist of one dancer. No other talent may be displayed in conjunction with the dance performance. All types of dancing will be judged in this category – tap, jazz, ballet, folk, ethnic, fad, etc. Gymnastics, tumbling, acrobatics, or any other form of gymnastics is not included in this category.
- DANCE GROUP shall consist of two or no more than fifteen dancers. No other talent may be displayed in conjunction with the dance performance. The same rules listed under Dance Solo apply.
- VARIETY shall consist of a performance of one or no more than twelve people. This category is intended to provide a proper showcase for those acts in

which multiple talents are displayed. Acts that fit the description of any other category will not be allowed to compete in this category. The following acts qualify for this category: juggling, ventriloquism, magic, gymnastics, and tumbling are the only allowable categories. No act may include a drum set(s), beat boxing, paint/watercolor, swords, any open flame or any form of liquid.

INSTRUMENTAL SOLO shall consist of an instrumental performance without vocal utterance by one performer. Taped accompaniment may be used. Contestants are encouraged to memorize their piece rather than use sheet music on stage. All contestants must use the keyboard that is provided. NO DRUMS!

Awards - The top three acts OVERALL will be presented cash awards of \$100 for first place, \$75 for second place, and \$50 for third place.

Sanctioning to State Contest The top-scoring act in each of the seven categories will be certified for participation in the Regional Competition at the Arkansas State Fair Youth Talent Contest during the Arkansas State Fair in Little Rock. Regional winners advance to State Fair Finals. Additional information can be found on the state fair's website. Contestants bear all expenses for their participation in both the regional semi-finals and state finals. They will be provided a copy of the rules and requirements for the state contest, and are responsible for following them. Participants at the county level will be notified immediately should there be any updates or changes to the state rules.

LENGTH OF PERFORMANCE

All acts must not exceed the 3-minute time limit (including recorded introduction). CD accompaniment is also subject to the same 3-minute time limit. The music being used for the talent acts must be the only music on the CD. No phones, iPods or MP3 players will be able to be used. The music must meet time limit requirements. No fading or stopping of the CD by the State Fair techs will be allowed. All acts are limited to a 1-minute time limit in setting up equipment. NO EXCEPTIONS! Setups and performances will be timed.

QUALIFICATIONS & RULES (per Arkansas State Fair)

The purpose of the Arkansas State Fair Youth Talent Contest is to discover, develop, and encourage talent in the youth of Arkansas. It is designed primarily for amateur talent, but any act which qualifies otherwise is eligible even if the act received pay at some time EXCEPT where the person(s) are engaged in the entertainment business or paid instructors of the Arts. Acts that may be considered professional should be brought to the attention of the County / District Fair Manager who will be responsible for notifying the State Youth Talent Director. The State Youth Talent Director will determine the contestant's eligibility. Their decision will be final.

TALENT CONTEST CONTINUED

- Junior Contestants must be 10 years of age and not more than 15 years of age by the opening day of the Arkansas State Fair. Senior Contestants must be 16 years of age and not more than 21 years of age by the opening day of the Arkansas State Fair. Any contestant appearing younger or older than the age limits specified should be prepared to furnish proof of age to the State Contest Director.
- Contestants must be legal residents of the state of Arkansas. Contestants must not have ever been convicted of any crime or have any criminal charges pending.
- The Grand Champion Winner(s) of the Arkansas State Fair Youth Talent Contest are not eligible to compete until person(s) is eligible to compete in the next age division. Senior Grand Champion Winner(s) will not be eligible to compete again. Contestants in the Arkansas State Fair Youth Talent Contest are not eligible to compete in the Arkansas State Fair Pageants or the Rodeo Queen Contest in the same year.

No contestant will be allowed to compete in more than two categories.

- Contestants can only compete in the county contest and win the Youth Talent Contest sanctioned by the County which they legally reside in. In the event a contestant's parents are divorced and live in separate counties and have been court ordered to reside jointly with both parents, the contestant can only compete in one of the two counties in which the contestant's parents reside. The State Fair is now requiring the county send their county winners to the state competition. All other county contestants are encouraged to compete at their respective district competition. Contestants must have entered a sanctioned county/district contest to compete.
- Entries to the Arkansas State Fair Youth Talent Contest are limited to one act in each of the seven (7) categories from each County or District Fair sanctioned by the Arkansas State Fair. Counties with two recognized Arkansas fairs can send one act for each of the 7 categories from each fair providing that each holds a sanctioned Youth Talent Contest. Any tie at the County or District level must be broken prior to entry in the State Contest. If a County or District Fair sends more than one act in any one category, all the acts in that category from that County or District Fair will be disqualified.

- In the event a County or District winner is unable to compete at the State Contest, the County or District Contest Official can send a runner-up to represent their fair.
- All acts must be performed on the stage. Please keep the stage dimensions in mind when preparing your talent presentation: State Fair Stage will be 40 feet in length, 24 feet in depth, and 2 feet in height. Dimensions are approximate.
- Contestants advancing to the state fair are required to be on time for all rehearsals and contests. Absent or tardy contestants are subject to disqualification, at the discretion of the Contest Director and State Fair Management.
- For Contestants advancing to the State Fair Entry forms must be legible and signed by each of the following: (1) contestant(s); (2) contestant's parent or guardian; (3) director. Director is responsible for filling out and submitting entry form. Entry forms MUST be sent to the State Fair office within 5 days following the County or District contest.
- Each contestant will receive two gate admission passes and one parking pass. We must have the entry form in time to mail the passes back to the CONTESTANT. If there is a group of two or more contestants, COMPLETE the mailing address portion of the application in which you desire the admission passes returned. Admission passes WILL NOT be mailed to each of the contestants individually. If you do not have your passes you will be required to pay gate admission and parking
- Entry Forms MUST be mailed. The Arkansas State Fair is not responsible for items lost or delayed in transit by any shipping method.
- Any display of poor sportsmanship and/or unbecoming conduct, any interference and/or disturbance, or any other behavioral problem created by a contestant, parent, county or district director, relative, or even a supporter of a contestant could result in disqualification of the contestant not only from this year's contest but also from future participation.
- Any inappropriate lyrics of a song in the vocal division, or inappropriate moves in the dance and variety categories will result in immediate disqualification. The contest director has the right to interrupt a performance if it is not deemed suitable for the Youth Talent Competition.

TALENT CONTEST CONTINUED

- No decorative or background props of any kind will be allowed. A prop must be used as a functional part of the contestant's act. Questionable props must be discussed and approved by the State Contest Director before arrival.
- The director and/or state fair management of the Arkansas state fair youth talent contest reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of or connected with, or incident to the contest, and the right to amend or add to these rules as their judgment may determine. Any contestant who fails to abide by any of the above rules will be disqualified from the regional and state contests by the state contest director and/or state fair management.

INSTRUMENTS AND MUSICAL ACCOMPANIMENT

Professional sound equipment including CD player and 5 microphones are provided, and their use is required. No personal CD players, cellphones, MP3 players, microphones or any other sound/tech equipment will be allowed. Musical accompaniment for any act must be recorded. Contestants must furnish their own CD's, which must contain only the music needed for performance and must not be longer than 3 minutes. Any act whose CD contains more than the music needed for their performance will be automatically disqualified. It is recommended you bring a second CD to have in case of an emergency. All CDs must be properly cued and labeled in advance and should be of good quality. All CD's should be clearly marked with contestant(s) name, county/district represented, time of tape, and music title, and division. All CD's must be claimed at the sound table immediately following the contest. The Arkansas State Fair Youth Talent Contest assumes no responsibility for CD's left unclaimed.

ANIMAL HEALTH RULES

No Animal will be allowed on grounds without Health Papers that meet the standards outlined by the Arkansas Livestock and Poultry Commission.

From Arkansas Livestock and Poultry Commission Effective: January 3, 2011

GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

- Certificates of Veterinary Inspection and Entry Permits "Certificate of Veterinary Inspection" refers to legible record (made on an official form issued from the state of origin by an accredited veterinarian, which shows that the animals listed thereon meet the health requirements of the state of destination. It must bear the identification of each animal and separate certificates must be made for each species of animal entered. Entry permits are required on all swine, and on cattle (steers exempt) from Class B and C states only. Permit numbers can be obtained from the State Veterinarian's office (501-907-2258) from 8-4:30, Monday through Friday. A certificate of veterinary inspection issued within 30 days of the exhibition must accompany all out-of-state animals; anD
 - a. Must be available on request by animal health officials.
 - b. Individually identify all animals, showing positive identification of each animal by tattoo, ear tag, registration number or ear notch. Steers should be identified by description.
 - c. Show required tests and/or vaccination.
 - d. Show name and address of owner or exhibitor this shall be the same name as under which animals are exhibited.
- 2. Any animal or poultry showing any evidence of infections or contagious disease, or of external parasitism, and animals with active ringworm lesions (with the resulting loss of hair), multiple warts easily visible without close examination, or atrophic rhinitis, will not be permitted to exhibit.
- 3. All animals entering the grounds, including those shown in pet zoos, children's barnyard animals, Old McDonald Farms, etc. must meet requirements of their particular species.
- 4. All animals originating out of areas quarantined because of other diseases (vesicular stomatitis, scabies, etc.) shall not be permitted to enter the State.

ARKANSAS LIVESTOCK

County, JR. District, District, and State Fair Level, & Other Shows

- 1. All animals entering the grounds, including those showing in pet zoo's, children's barnyard animals, Old McDonald Farms, etc. must meet the requirements of their particular species.
- 2. Arkansas livestock (except for Arkansas sheep, goats, horses, steers, and rabbits) must be accompanied by a certificate of veterinary inspection issued within 90 days prior to exhibition, showing the following:

CATTLE

- 1. Negative brucellosis test within 90 days prior to exhibition, for females and bulls 18 months of age and over. All heifers that have calved or are bred must be tested. Animals originating from a Certified Brucellosis Free Herd and Certified Free Herd number is shown on certificate are exempt. If Arkansas is a Class Free State, Arkansas cattle are exempt from testing.
- 2. All heifers that are 4-12 months of age shall be vaccinated before entering show.
- 3. Heifers that were born on or after January 1, 1985 that are over 12 months of age and not official calfhood vaccinates will not be allowed to show (unless from certified free herd.)
- 4. All rodeo stock exhibited at a rodeo in Arkansas must meet the out of state requirements for brucellosis and tuberculosis for twelve (12) month and older bulls, roping and dogging steers, and heifers even if the rodeo stock originates from Arkansas. Tie down roping calves are exempt from the tuberculosis testing requirements. The exception is a CVI within the state is good for ninety (90) days instead of thirty (30) days.

SWINE

- 1. As of July 1, 2001, all swine must have an official premise identification.
- 2. Animals 6 months old or older to be tested negative for brucellosis within 90 days of exhibition or originating out of Validated Herd, with validation number and date of last herd test shown on certificate (barrows exempt from brucellosis testing, but must be pseudorabies tested).
- 3. Animals to be tested negative for pseudorabies regardless of age within 90 days of the exhibition on a test approved by the state veterinarian or originate directly out of a Qualified Pseudorabies Free Herd, with Qualified Herd number and date of last test shown on certificate.
- 4. Free of other contagious, infectious, and communicable diseases (erysipelas, atrophic rhinitis, etc.); otherwise they will not be allowed to show and will be released from fairgrounds.

ARKANSAS SHOW SWINE EXHIBITORS SHOULD BE AWARE THAT IT IS THEIR RESPONSIBILITY TO OBTAIN A VALID INTERSTATE CERTIFICATE OF VETERINARY INSPECTION (ICVI) AND A PERMIT TO IMPORT SWINE INTO ARKANSAS. NO ONE WANTS TO BE THE ONE RESPONSIBLE FOR BRINGING A DISEASE INTO ARKANSAS CAUSING GREAT FINANCIAL HARM.

SHEEP & GOATS

Any sheep or goat showing clinical symptoms of scrapie shall be immediately quarantined in isolation and required to undergo any approved diagnostic tests and shall be consigned to slaughter or destruction with submission of tissues to an approved diagnostic laboratory at the exhibitor's expense. Commingling (as defined by Arkansas Scrapie Regulation) of sheep or goats of different flock status as defined by the Voluntary Flock Certification Program (VFCP) is prohibited and must be reported to the VFCP state official and State Veterinarian. No sheep or goats showing symptoms of disease, particularly foot rot, sore mouth, sheep pox, evidence of fungal infection, evidence of abscesses or with draining abscesses will be allowed to show and may be released by fair officials, veterinarians, or state-federal personnel.

SHEEP

All sheep must be tagged with Scrapie Identification Tag upon arrival on the fairgrounds. If your sheep are from a Certified Scrapie Free Herd advise Superintendent to be penned accordingly. Sheep will be inspected on grounds. No sheep showing symptoms of foot-rot or wool fungus will be allowed to be penned or shown.

DAIRY GOATS

All registered goats entering fairgrounds must be accompanied by a registration certificate (in exhibitors name) with matching permanent identification(tattoo).

All unregistered goats must be tagged with Scrapie Identification Tag upon arrival on the fairgrounds. If your goats are from a Certified Scrapie Free Herd advise Superintendent to be penned accordingly. Health certificates will not be required, but goats may be examined on the grounds by fair personnel, veterinarians or state-federal personnel. Goats showing evidence of disease may be released.

RABBITS

Rabbits will be inspected on grounds. No rabbits showing symptoms of disease will be allowed to show. Health certificates are required for all out of state rabbits.

POULTRY

An official representing the exhibition shall notify the state veterinarian no later than thirty (30) days prior to the exhibition giving names, place, inclusive dates and time of the event. The requirements are as follows:

- All in-state poultry, which includes domesticated game birds, quail, pheasants, peafowl, guineas, and turkeys, present an exhibition in Arkansas have originated from U.S. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean or equivalent flocks or have a negative pullorum-typhoid test with-in ninety (90) days of the movement to the exhibition (pullorum-typhoid testing on fairgrounds during the fair is prohibited). This information will be documented on a NPIP Form VS 9-3, 90 Day Certificate, NPIP Flock Certification Form or similar certificate which will accompany the poultry during exhibition.
- 2. All non-certified birds must be banded (leg or wing band), with a sealed band. Wrap-around plastic bands are not acceptable. In-state waterfowl are exempt from pullorum-typhoid requirements.
- 3. Any poultry showing evidence of infectious or contagious disease or insect infestation will not be permitted to exhibit.

HORSES

Negative EIA test required within past twelve months for all animals over 6 months of age. Nursing foals under 6 months of age are exempt from testing if accompanied by negative tested dams. Photocopies of the test papers will not be accepted; carbon copies are acceptable. A person who is certified must check papers.

Open to Washington County residents <u>ONLY</u>; open to horses of all breeds, registered and grade. *4-H/FFA Members from other counties may only compete if they are in a Washington County 4-H Club that they declare as their main club; or if they attend a school in Washington County. Youth are not allowed to compete in two county fair horse shows.*
- 2. No entry fees will be charged.
- 3. Premium checks will be mailed to all exhibitors after the conclusion of the fair.
- 4. Registration for the show opens at 7:30 a.m. Halter/Showmanship entries must be received by 8:30 a.m. The show starts at <u>9:00 a.m.</u>

## **OPEN LIVESTOCK DEPARTMENT**

#### **GENERAL RULES**

- 1. Only registered animals that are purebred or pureblood livestock (one purebred parent), with papers, can be entered except for commercial beef classes and grade dairy heifers.
- 2. Animals must be registered in the name of the exhibitor and have been owned by him or her for at least 60 days prior to the fair.
- 3. Original registration papers and other information requested by the superintendent must be presented for entry in the show.
- 4. Exhibitors shall show their animals at such times and places as directed.
- 5. In Beef only Champion and Reserve Championships, 1st and 2nd place animals can be shown in both Open and Junior Division where there is competition.
- 6. All pens must be cleaned by 10:00am each day and refuse disposed as directed by the superintendents.
- 7. All space will be assigned by the superintendent who has the right to move animals in the best interest of the show.
- 8. EXHIBITORS ARE ALLOWED ONLY TWO ENTRIES IN EACH CLASS AND ONE ENTRY IN GROUP CLASSES.
- 9. EXHIBITORS MUST PRE-REGISTER THEIR ANIMALS WITH THE SUPERINTENDENT AND SEND ENTRY FORM TO LIVESTOCK ENTRIES 2537 N. McConnell Ave. Fayetteville, AR 72704. Entries should be postmarked by August 1.
- 10. No grooming chutes are allowed in the barns.
- 11. ALL LIVESTOCK MUST ENTER THROUGH GATE NO. 2 FOR CHECKING OF HEALTH PAPERS.
- 12. Junior breeding stock placing 1st or 2nd in their class may show in the Open Division, if there is competition, for 1/2 the premium.
- 13. Duties of a Ring Steward
  - To keep animals in order by weight or age to aid the judge in evaluation.
  - To assist exhibitors with unruly or immobile animals to insure a safe, orderly
  - show.
  - To see that the judges instructions are followed by the exhibitors.
  - To assist exhibitor in catching and regaining control of an animal.
  - To assist the judge if he decides an animal should be tied to the rail or excused from the ring.

- 14. The Washington County Fair Board will not furnish material to bed animals.
- 15. No straw will be furnished by the Fair Association. Straw can only be used in tieout areas, except for wet dairy cattle.
- 16. Must pre-register livestock to receive car pass. See rules.
- 17. Care of Exhibits Animals: All Stalls, pens and exhibition places must be cleaned before 9:00 AM each day and refuse disposed of as directed by show management. If exhibitor refuses to keep their stalls, pens and/or exhibits clean and neat, management reserves the right to have animals removed from the grounds or opt to have the stalls/pens properly cleaned with the cost charged to exhibitor. With this being said, all cattle must be brought from tie out areas to barns before 9:00 AM each day. All animals must be properly fed and watered and looked after by the exhibitors. If management sees that animals are being neglected or left unattended for long periods of time during the day, they reserve the right to remove the animals from the grounds.

## JUNIOR LIVESTOCK DEPARTMENT

## **GENERAL RULES**

- All general and open livestock show rules apply except grade dairy cows and heifers may be shown. Grade dairy animals must be purebred or appear purebred. No beef cross animals will be allowed, except in commercial beef classes.
- 2. Only junior exhibitors are allowed to show an animal for exhibitors in the junior department.
- 3. Animals entered in the market classes shall be weighed in and identified as directed by the superintendents.
- 4. Exhibitors may exhibit in this department no later than the fall after graduating from high school.
- 5. Junior breeding animals will be judged on a danish systems with no more than 5 blue ribbons given per class.
- 6. Animals must be registered in the name of the exhibitor and have been owned by him or her for at least 60 days prior to the fair. Except rabbits they must be owned for 30 days prior.
- 7. All market animals must be tagged prior to the fair. Tagging dates listed below. Call superintendents with any questions.
  - Market Steers, Market Hogs and Market Lambs:
  - In lieu of a WCF tag, we will now use a 840 or scrapie tag
  - Rabbit Meat Pens and Fryers
    - i. August 6 8:0– AM 12:00 PM Washington Co. Fair Grounds
- 8. Registration papers and other information requested by the superintendent must be presented for entry in the show.
- 9. Exhibitors shall show their animals at such times and places as directed.
- 10. All pens must be cleaned by 10:00 AM each day and refuse disposed as directed by the superintendents.
- 11. All space will be assigned by the superintendent who has the right to move animals in the best interest of the show.
- 12. EXHIBITORS ARE ALLOWED ONLY TWO ENTRIES IN EACH CLASS AND ONE ENTRY IN GROUP CLASSES.
- 13. EXHIBITORS MUST PRE-REGISTER THEIR ANIMALS TO RECEIVE GATE PASS BY MAILING ENTRY FORM TO LIVESTOCK ENTRIES 2537 N. MCCONNELL AVE. FAYETTEVILLE, AR 72704. ENTRIES MUST BE POSTMARKED BY AUGUST 1.
- 14. No grooming chutes are allowed in the barns.
- 15. All livestock must enter through gate No. 1 for checking of health papers.
- 16. Duties of a Ring Steward:
  - To keep animals in order by weight or age to aid the judge in evaluation.
  - To assist exhibitors with unruly or immobile animals to insure a safe, orderly show.
  - To see that the judges instructions are followed by the exhibitors.
  - To assist exhibitor in catching and regaining control of an animal.
  - To assist the judge if he decides an animal should be tied to the rail or excused from the ring.
  - 17. The Washington County Fair Board will not furnish material to bed animals.

- 18. No straw will be furnished by the Fair Association. Straw can only be used in tie-out areas.
- 19. No drenching of animals on fairgrounds unless accompanied with letter from vet that must be given to superintendent.

- 22. Junior breeding stock placing first or second in their class may show in the open division if there is competition for half the premium.

Exhibits must be entered on Saturday, August 20, between 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. The only exceptions are entries in the Food Preparation department, which entries will be accepted on Saturday and also on Monday of fair week from 8:00 a.m. to 12 noon.

Exhibits are to be checked out between 2:00 p.m. and 4:00 p.m., Sunday, August 28. The FAIR ASSOCIATION IS NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR ARTICLES LEFT AFTER 4:00 P.M. ON SUNDAY. All exhibits remaining on the fairgrounds after that time will become the property of the Washington County Fair Association to be disposed of as it sees fit.

Personal entry card must be filled out and presented when entering items in Thompson Hall, Open Division. Pre-numbered entry cards are available at the information desk table. No premiums will be paid to exhibitors not turning in entry card. Checks will be mailed to each eligible exhibitor.

ALL WORTHY EXHIBITS RECEIVE A BLUE, RED, OR WHITE RIBBON AS DETERMINED BY THE JUDGES, AND PREMIUM MONEY AS DESIGNATED IN THE CATALOG. IN ADDITION, SPECIFIED GRAND CHAMPION EXHIBITS WILL BE SELECTED FOR EACH DIVISION AND AWARDED A ROSETTE RIBBON AND AN EXTRA \$5.00 IN PREMIUM MONEY.

All exhibits shall be governed by the general rules unless otherwise stated. Rules and instructions unique to each division are listed at the beginning of that division's section of the catalog.

All space in Thompson Hall Open Building will be assigned by the General Superintendent who has the right to move exhibits, if in the best interest of the fair.

Articles should be in new condition and never before exhibited at any county fair. Soiled articles, unsealed canned foods or those in non-standard jars, pictures not properly equipped for display, and other articles that fail to meet the standards and instructions listed in the catalog will not be judged.

Exhibitor must be a resident of Washington County or a member of an Extension Homemakers Club in the county.

- 1. Exhibits must be entered in the name of the person making them.
- 2. Exhibitor must use the same name on all exhibits shown throughout the fair.
- 3. Designations for special classes of exhibitors will be denoted on entry tags as follows:
  - a. S-Senior Citizen (age 80 and older)
  - b. H-Handicapped
  - c. P—Professional (one who is in the business of producing and selling the type of article being exhibited)

These designations will be considered by judges when determining premium awards. Professional exhibitors are <u>not</u> eligible for the Grand Champion awards.

Two (2) entries are permitted per class with the exclusion of the Photography, Table Setting, and Educational Booths divisions. Entries must be in a different pattern or variety to be entered into the same class. Entries must remain on exhibit in the division entered, and cannot be a part of an additional exhibit to be judged. (Example: an individual entry cannot also be a part of a group entry or exhibit).

Only required personnel with special designated name tags will be allowed in the building during judging. Since judging in Thompson Hall will begin before the 12 noon deadline for entering exhibits in the Food Preparation division, those exhibitors are asked to go directly to that area to check in their exhibits, and then to leave the building immediately.

No junior may compete in the Open division.

- 1. Canned products must be shown in either standard or wide mouth pint or  $\frac{1}{2}$  pint jars. No other jars will be accepted including quart jars.
- 2. Only sealed jars of jams, jellies and preserves will be accepted (no paraffin).
- 3. Judges reserve the rights to open jars of dried products.
- 4. Products exhibited must be in the name of the person who canned them.
- 5. All jars must be washed and clean on the outside.
- 6. Each jar must be sealed with two piece vacuum caps and flats not buckled. No one piece lids.
- 7. PLEASE NOTE: Special entry tags and labels will be provided by the Fair and should be used. All jars should have labels that list method and processing times. These may be picked up before the fair from the Cooperative Extension Service Office and will be available at check-in.
- 8. ALL ENTRIES MUST FOLLOW USDA RECOMMENDATIONS FOR TIME, TEMPERATURE AND PROCESSING METHODS. Recommendations may be obtained at nchfp.uga.edu.

### RULES

In addition to the general Youth Home Economics rules:

- 1. Canned products must be shown in either standard pints or half-pint jars. Only dried herbs can be displayed in quarter pint jars.
- 2. Only vacuum sealed jars of jam, jellies and preserves will be accepted. (No paraffin)
- 3. All tomato products (class 14, 15, and 16) need to have added acid (i.e. lemon juice, vinegar, or citric acid) as recommended by the USDA for safe water bath processing.
- 4. All tomatoes with vegetables and spaghetti sauce (class 29 and 30) must be pressure canned.
- 5. Judges reserve the right to open jars in case of doubt.
- 6. Products exhibited must be entered in name of person canning them.
- 7. All jars must be washed clean on the outside.
- 8. Each jar should be sealed with 2 piece vacuum lids and rings. No dented flats will be accepted. Dried products should be in standard canning jars but not sealed.
- 9. PLEASE NOTE: Special entry tags and labels will be provided by the Fair and should be used. All jars should have labels that list method and processing times. These may be picked up before the fair from the Cooperative Extension Service Office and will be at check-in.
- 10. ALL ENTRIES MUST FOLLOW USDA RECOMMENDATIONS FOR TIME, TEMPERATURE AND PROCESSING METHODS. Recommendations may be obtained at nchfp.uga.edu. Scorecards: Available online at mywashingtoncountyfair.com

- 6. Participants will be judged on correctly setting table and ability will be taken into account, with overall appearance and theme. Participants will have the option to leave the judge any considerations they feel that would explain their entry.
- All acceptable exhibits will be given ribbons and cash awards as follows: Blue-\$3.00, Red-\$2.00, White-\$1. With a Grand Champion award for best overall.
- 8. All exhibits will be placed in a fenced-in area. However, the fair association cannot be held responsible for any loss or damages to property.

### **GENERAL RULES**

- 1. ALL WORTHY EXHIBITS THAT FOLLOW RULES RECEIVE A BLUE, RED, OR WHITE RIBBON AS DETERMINED BY THE JUDGES, AND PREMIUM MONEY AS DESIGNATED IN THE CATALOG. IN ADDITION, ONE GRAND AND RESERVE CHAMPION EXHIBIT WILL BE SELECTED FOR EACH DIVISION.
- 2. Each Youth Division will have a Judges Choice Awarded to a 4-Her from the 4-H Parent and Leaders' Association.
- 3. A new registration card must be filled out before going to entry table. Each exhibitor will receive an envelope with their unique number. This number is the first number on the entry tag attached to the exhibit.
- 4. All exhibits shall be governed by the general rules unless otherwise stated.
- 5. All entries should be grown and tended by exhibitors or family for 90 days and entered in exhibitor's name.
- 6. Entries in Horticulture and Field Crops should be clean and whole, but trimmed of excess foliage. Entries will be judged on uniformity, quality, and free of disease and insect damage.
- 7. Potted Plants & Cut Flowers rules are listed on their pages.
- 8. Flower arrangement containers must have name on bottom of containers and the containers will be judged as part of exhibit. Accessories may be used in arrangements. Fair association will not be responsible for containers or accessories. Materials used in dried arrangements should be NATURAL MATERIALS FROM AREA. Driftwood arrangement CAN NOT CONTAIN ANY SOIL. Arrangements may not have artificial materials except class 23(driftwood).Arrangements must be assembled at home and may not be made at entry tables due to space and time.

- 9. Entomology is open to youth only and has three classes: pinned box, one insect pinned and photo. An individual may enter one entry in three classes. Repeat entries should have more entries each year entered. All insects must be mounted on standard insect pins in accordance with 4-H entomology standards.
- 10. Outdoor Art must be made or hand painted by person entering exhibit. Only one entry per exhibitor. See page for classes.
- 11. Exhibits will be accepted Monday 9:00 AM 7:00 PM. Exhibitors must be in door by 6:45pm.
- 12. All exhibits must stay in place until the fair closes or no premium money will be given. Fair is not responsible for vases left.
- 13. Judging will begin Tuesday Morning at 8:00am.
- 14. The Horticulture Building will open when judging is complete.
- 15. Open age is 19 and over.
- 16. Only one entry per class per exhibitors will be accepted. Check out time will be Sunday 2:00pm to 4:00pm only. The FAIR ASSOCIATION IS NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR ARTICLES LEFT AFTER 4:00PM ON SUNDAY. All remaining on the fairgrounds after that time will become the property of the Washington County Fair Association to be disposed of as it sees fit.
- 17. Premium money will be mailed to each eligible exhibitor. Please verify address is correct on your registration card.



### SAMPLE ENTRY TAG

(Every exhibit MUST have an entry tag.)

Please follow these directions to completely your entry tag correctly.

**No.** – This is your unique number assigned to you when you complete the registration card prior to entering any exhibits. This number goes on every entry tag you have and is used by the Fair for mailing any premium checks or communication with you.

**Division** – This is always a letter. A single letter for Open Division (adults) and a double letter for Juniors. An example for Junior Fruit and Vegetables would be GG and Junior Cut Flowers would be H-AA.

**Class** – This tells what you are entering. An Example for Junior Fruits and Vegetables would be 1 for Green Beans or 17 for Purple Eggplant.

**Entry** – This is the name of what you are entering, such as Green Beans or Marigold, large.

**Name** – Your name that you put on your registration card.



- 2. Exhibitors may freshen arrangements during the week after judging is completed. Entries will be released Sunday from 2:00pm to 4:00pm. Fair is not responsible for containers or items left after 4pm Sunday.
- 3. The container will be judged as a part of the exhibit.
- 4. Each exhibit must have name and address of the exhibitor on the bottom of the container.

- 9. No artificial materials may be used in any arrangement, except class 23.

- 3. The container will be judged as a part of the exhibit.

- 9. No artificial materials may be used in any arrangement, except class 23.
